#### Chairperson's Report

I'm sure there are people all over the world sitting down to write annual reports who are sitting at their computers thinking "Wow, what a weird year, where do I start?" So at the risk of stating the obvious...wow, what a weird year. We are now over a year into the pandemic, and this will be the second Annual General Meeting that we hold via Zoom. I remember last year our board wondering if we were within the terms of our constitution if we did not hold a live meeting – we ultimately decided we were – but that seems so long ago to me now, after a year of almost exclusively holding meetings virtually. How quickly we humans adapt!

The pandemic obviously affected our organization in a variety of ways, as it did almost every other not-for-profit. Despite the pandemic restrictions however, we did manage to continue to function, and to further our mission and vision. We had to get creative in the process, and really begin to think "inside" the box – the boxes being our various electronic devices! We increased our profile on our social media platforms, moved our General Meetings onto Zoom, and embarked on our first-ever podcast series. When pandemic restrictions permitted, we held a contest for families to win a free photo shoot, and with their permission then used those photos on social media to illustrate attachment-related concepts. While pandemic restrictions permitted, we continued to offer our "Attachment 101" workshops free to community groups, but when the restrictions tightened up, we provided this service virtually.

We like to look for silver linings around here, and the pandemic has had a few. When we took our General Meetings online, we were thrilled to welcome participants from across Canada and the United States! This allowed for an exchange of ideas that would not have taken place otherwise, and also allowed parents of young children to participate without having to worry about child care. We are considering using this format for future General Meetings. Look for us to begin expanding these General Meetings into more frequent "lunch and learn" sessions with various presenters from all over the continent in the coming year.

The onset of the pandemic forced us to reschedule our 'Reframing Addictions – the Crisis of Disconnection' conference with Johann Hari to the spring of this year, and continued restrictions forced us eventually to make the decision to formally cancel that initiative. This was disappointing, as we know how desperate the addiction crisis is here in our community. In response, we decided to approach the members of our community who were to be part of a panel discussion as part of that conference, and ask if they would join us in moving that important conversation to a podcast format. Dedicated troupers that they are, they all agreed, and we are pleased to be launching this podcast series this month. Many thanks to our podcast committee – Katie McDonald, Carmella Birori and Viola Plett – for all the hard work that went into this initiative!

Over the past year, the Network was also able to continue our practice of sponsoring individuals to attend training relevant to work in the field of attachment. Look for details regarding this initiative elsewhere in the annual report.

As most of you know, the Network has created a series of brochures on parenting over the past few years. These are still available to order or download on our website, however due to the pandemic most organizations are not permitted to distribute paper products. We invite you to share links to these resources as an alternative. Over the past year, we also launched three new brochures, one for parents of children with FASD, one for separated parents in a co-parenting situation, and one for those who have a loved one struggling with addiction. Please check these out online and share the links with anyone you know who might benefit.

Somewhere down the road, the pandemic will be behind us. Our hope is that one of the silver linings is an increased understanding and appreciation within our society of the crucial importance of connection and relationship to our mental health and wellness. To further this, one of our virtual initiatives this year was a blog series, which is still ongoing. The theme of the series is the idea of attachment on a larger stage, and was motivated by our concern for the

current state of the world and a desire to put something out there that might inspire. The blog pieces look at relationship and connection in societal contexts such as the workplace, friendships, addictions, schools, and even sports. Check them out on our website.

No yearly summation would be complete without a shout-out to our wonderful board members. This is as brilliant and principled a group of people as you could hope to find anywhere – I am so grateful for the opportunity to learn from each and every one of them. Thanks to you all! And perhaps it's fitting that an organization devoted to attachment keeps saying hello and goodbye to board members because of babies! In the coming year we will be wishing Carmella Birori a happy maternity leave, and welcoming Sayma Malik back from hers! Thanks for your work on the board Carmella, we hope to see you back next year, and Sayma – so glad to have you back!

#### Conference Report 2021

Our conference, Reframing Addiction: The Crisis of Disconnection originally scheduled for May 13/21 was cancelled due to the Coronavirus pandemic. This was a difficult but necessary decision after many months of uncertainty and an inability to plan due to the pandemic. The conference had been scheduled to take place at the Winnipeg Art Gallery and was to feature renowned author Johann Hari, whose books, "Lost Connections" and "Chasing the Scream" focus on mental health; specifically depression and addiction and their root causes of disconnection and trauma. Our network was excited to expand our concept and understanding of attachment and the challenges of addiction. As with previous conferences, our plan was to showcase local resources as well as host a panel of local mental health/addiction clinicians and activists with both professional and lived experience. It is always a goal of the Attachment Network conferences to offer a glimpse of our landscape here in Manitoba. We encountered challenges with the agency that represented Johann Hari once the conference was canceled. It was our first experience of using an Intellectual Talent Agency to secure a speaker and having our money refunded in the midst of a world pandemic required legal services after our calls and emails went unanswered. We were fortunate to have the services of both a local law firm and lawyer "friend" of our board recognize our status as a non-profit and provide their services at a low cost. In the end, and after much negotiation and many months, our deposit was fully refunded. In an effort to continue the work of attachment and addiction the Network is pleased to offer a series of podcasts with some of the local folks who had agreed to serve on our panel. Like so many things in the course of this difficult pandemic, the Attachment Network learned how to "pivot" in this case, from conference to podcast. Planning for our next conference will take patience and time. We look forward to a time when we can safely learn together and once again be inspired.

#### Sponsorship Initiative

Last summer, the Network sponsored four individuals from a variety of fields to participate in the online version of the Circle of Security Parenting Program Facilitator training. The condition of sponsorship was that these individuals deliver two COSP groups in their respective fields prior to the end of 2021. Although the pandemic has made this requirement more challenging, some of these individuals have managed to begin delivering their groups. Here are some of their comments:

It is such a privilege to share the Circle of Security with families committed to meeting the needs of children for healthy secure attachments. Since completing the online training, I cofacilitated a COSR (Reunification) group with parents focused on family reunification with their children in the fall of 2020 Currently, I am coordinating a plan to cofacilitate, via the Teams platform, a COS-FCP (Foster Care Provider) group that will begin in the next few weeks. I am thrilled to be continuing the work of helping parents and caregivers view their personal reflections and experiences through the lens of Circle of Security, and applying this knowledge within their relationships.

I will be hosting a COSP group of 5 (and counting) participants in June/July, and another group in September/October that currently has 3 participants that I'm working on growing. The last Attachment Network Meeting we had sparked some ideas for future groups that are a little outside of the box. I'm going to flesh them out a little bit more and then run them by (the network) to get your input!

#### **Public Awareness Committee**


Over the past year, the efforts of this committee have been hampered by the COVID-19 restrictions. Our ability to distribute our various brochures – whether selling them or giving them away to community organizations – has been severely limited by the fact that most organizations have stopped giving out printed material. Nevertheless, the work that was in progress when the pandemic began continued to fruition, in the form of three new brochures! Like the parenting series, these are also available for purchase or download on our website. Once we had completed the "10 Things" parenting series, we decided to turn our attention to other important issues that we felt were attachment-related. We identified parents of children with FASD, individuals who are separated and find themselves in a coparenting situation, and individuals who have a loved one struggling with addiction as groups who could benefit from some support and guidance with an attachment lens. Although there is not a great demand presently for paper copies of these brochures, we encourage you to check them out on our website, and share the link to them with anyone you know for whom you feel they would be helpful.

Recently, the Public Awareness Committee merged with our existing Social Media Committee, with the realization that much of the public awareness we do these days actually takes place on virtual platforms. As is the case with everyone these days, we now hold our meetings virtually. We are looking forward to the great ideas that will arise from the merger of these two productive committees!
